All Saints

The first day of November is the feast of All Saints. In a good Protestant medical Mission saints may not be the highlight of the year! They were a contentious issue at the Reformation because the Protestant watchword was « justification by faith. » In other traditions, like the Catholic one, Christians still ask the Saints to pray for them. Some, but by no means all Anglicans, do so as well. The tradition existed because medieval Christians worried about "the devil and all his works." The devil was renounced, along with "all the sinful lusts of the flesh" in the Anglican catechism until only forty years ago.

Sometimes wall paintings in old churches include lurid pictures of Satan or the devil, or indeed of demons together with the fires of eternal punishment. Satan is the Hebrew for an "adversary" and not a name. In this case, the adversary is one who opposes God's will. So Jesus' death on the cross and his resurrection includes our liberation from the cosmic or universal powers of darkness - Ephesians 6:12.

God is on our side and he makes that real by the word made flesh who shares our nature. As for us, we are sinners, but sin is quite a difficult concept. At the time of the Reformation Christians were worried about transgressions. That means being bad or naughty. The word is used in the new testament, but the more usual word for "sin" is about falling short - $\alpha\mu\alpha\rho\tau\iota\alpha$ rather than $\pi\alpha\rho\alpha\pi\tau\omega\mu\alpha$ which means transgression. None of us is complete: we are imperfect or we fall ill and we need God's love.

Because making a mistake or being imperfect is not culpable, asking the Saints to pray for us is not very logical as mistakes or imperfection are less blameworthy than transgression. The New Testament seems to agree because it says relatively little about forgiveness just as St. Paul writes about reconciliation. The word is $\kappa\alpha\tau\alpha\lambda\lambda\alpha\gamma\omega$ (katallago). It refers to the other with whom we hope to be "make our peace." The word for forgiveness, $\alpha\phi\iota\eta\mu\iota$ refers to taking something away, as if it had never happened. We may be tempted by the idea because it is simple. Unfortunately the removal of responsibility and the concomitant non-responsibility also diminished our dignity because we were not responsible for what we do or have done.

The overwhelming majority of human beings are pretty immune from leprosy. It is not a person's fault that he or she has the disease and it is certainly not punishment by a vengeful god with a small g. It might be a weakness, but then Jesus died to make us more complete, to reconcile and redeem or save us $(\sigma \omega \tau \eta \rho \iota \alpha)$ means salvation). The work of a medical mission is to take part in that process.

Let's go back to those saints. In Greek they are called the hagioi, which is used for saints but means "holy" as well. That is arguably the real meaning in the best Greek. So, who are all the saints. Well, we are among them. We may not be as good as some of the official ones, but our medicine is better. Veronica tended Jesus on his way to Calvary and in tending the ill or handicapped we do likewise.

So, whether we like Saints who pray for us or not, we are part of that "multitude whom no man has numbered, whose hope was in the word made flesh." As for being a saint, Veronica tended Jesus on his way to the cross and we should meet human need wherever and whenever we find it. As for the prayers of saints, that is a more open question than sharing the love of God towards those whose failings are not culpable or in sharing his reconciling love to the culpable. We care for people who experience the simple injustice of disease which no one deserves.

'The Repair Shop'

Psalm 103:1-14 and Psalm 23:3 "...He restores my soul..."

There's a series of programmes on British TV called 'The Repair Shop', set in an old barn. People bring in items badly in need of repair, and always there are precious memories attached to them, -long-gone relatives, childhood gifts, personal family histories. There are broken vases, beautiful old clocks, mechanical toys, well-loved teddy-bears, antique furniture, damaged paintings, ...the list goes on and on.

In the Repair Shop, the commentator tells us, are "some of the country's leading crafts-people": a clock-maker, leatherworker, blacksmith, stained-glass maker, ceramics artist, art repairer, furniture restorer, seamstress, and so on! They get to work on the projects brought in, some in a very poor state of neglect or damage. At the end of each programme the owners return to find their treasured possessions transformed, working perfectly, sometimes shining like new, sometimes restored but with something of the wear and tear of the ages left as a sensitive tribute to history and memory.

The delight and disbelief, tears and gratitude of the owners, seeing their possessions rejuvenated, touch something deeply in me; maybe I can empathise from my own history!

What makes the programme special for me is the craftsmen and women. They ask about the history and memories attached to the items; what they mean to their owners. These experts have a gentle, understanding manner; their expertise and skill are enhanced by a sensitive respect for things, and an empathy for the owners.

But there's another thing that strikes me about the programme: the introduction ends with the phrase: "...they will resurrect, revive and rejuvenate...". I'm reminded of the hymn based on Psalm 103: "Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven, to his feet thy tribute bring.. ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven..." So every time I watch this programme, I think "That's what God does!" I think of the familiar words of Psalm 23, "He restores my soul". It is what our heavenly Father does, through the gift and sacrifice of his precious Son and the ongoing work of his Holy Spirit.

But that's not where the comparisons with this TV programme end. The lead craftsman says, "Everybody has something that means too much to be thrown away..." I am amazed to think that I mean too much to God to be thrown away. So he redeems, restores, revives, rejuvenates, ... resurrects!

And one more thing about this programme: the crafts-people don't just polish things up! They take them apart, they deep-clean, they unpick every stitch, replace broken and rotten parts to look like new, they make repairs invisible. But the process looks alarming, messy... broken! I thank God that he doesn't do a superficial clean-up on me. As the pilgrim-journey of life continues he breaks, melts, restores, repairs, -he goes deep. It can be messy, painful, heart-and-life-breaking, but the result is transformation, -to be completed when my owner comes to collect me! "If anyone is in Christ, she or he is a new creation!"

Praise God for the ultimate 'repair shop' of his kingdom, the all-sufficiency of his redeeming work, and his perfect love, by which you and I "mean too much to be thrown away". It's the love that drew salvation's plan.

May God bless each of us in the restorative process!

Let Go - Move On or Letting go of the past - Welcoming the future − 1.

1 Samuel 15 v 34 -16 v 13

I. Letting go of the past

16. 1 The Lord said to Samuel, 'How long will you grieve over Saul?

It is not easy to let someone go. I guess it is a feeling parents experience when their children move on a stage in life. As well as needing to let go of people there are times when we move on, or we should move on and yet are reluctant to do so. The past is comfortable and we know what to expect, the moving on has aspects on the unknown, and can be frightening; In Samuel's case there was a definite risk.

In 1 Samuel 15 v 36 to 16 v 13, Samuel is put in an impossible situation by the Lord. "Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons.' Isn't this treason? I am sure Saul would think som if he heard of it

There are 2 questions *How long will you <u>arieve</u> over Saul?* the Let Go in the title and *'How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me.'* the moving on despite the danger.

Samuel is instructed to let go and move on. I spent a long time grieving for India, I left thinking I would return, left without saying goodbye to friends who were going to come and see me off. This was followed be a year of uncertainty wondering where I would go or what I would do next. Things were out of my control. It took me time to move on. Samuel was taking time to realise the young man he had anointed was not to be the founder of the dynasty of Israel's kings. There was a replacement.

When the people had come and asked him for a king Samuel had warned them that it would not all be happiness.

Samuel's grief at Saul's departure from the way of the Lord is understandable. The young man he had anointed, returned home. Then when Samuel calls the people to chose their king at Mizpah, Saul has disappeared, finally he is found *hiding in the baggage*, See I Samuel 11

Was he reluctant to take up the task? Maybe he knew he couldn't cope. We don't know. Samuel had encouraged him, and then watches it go wrong; very wrong. No wonder he is grieving the young promising lad who has gone wayward, and latterly is unstable. The relationship between Samuel and Saul can't have been easy the man of God feeling that the people had rejected God when they asked for a king to be like the countries round about. The people had also rejected Samuel who was a Judge.

We mourn unfilled hopes as Samuel did. He clings to a dying order, maybe still hoping for the return to the system of Judges. But he does let go, he does move forward as we need to do.



Let Go - Move On or Letting go of the past - Welcoming the future − 2.

1 Samuel 15 v 34 -16 v 13

II - Welcoming the future

34 Then Samuel went to Ramah; and Saul went up to his house in Gibeah of Saul. 35Samuel did not see Saul again until the day of his death, but Samuel grieved over Saul. And the Lord was sorry_that he had made Saul king over Israel. 16 The Lord said to Samuel, 'How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons.' 2 Samuel said, 'How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me.' And the Lord said, 'Take a heifer with you, and say, "I have come to sacrifice to the Lord." 3Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the one whom I name to you.' 4Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, 'Do you come peaceably?' 5He said, 'Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice.' And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

6 When they came, he looked on Eliab and thought, 'Surely the Lord's anointed is now before the Lord.' 7But the Lord said to Samuel, 'Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart.' 8Then Jesse called Abinadab, and made him pass before Samuel. He said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' 9Then Jesse made Shammah pass by. And he said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' 10Jesse made seven of his sons pass before Samuel, and Samuel said to Jesse, 'The Lord has not chosen any of these.' 11Samuel said to Jesse, 'Are all your sons here?' And he said, 'There remains yet the youngest, but he is keeping the sheep.' And Samuel said to Jesse, 'Send and bring him; for we will not sit down until he comes here.' 12He sent and brought him in. Now he was ruddy and had beautiful eyes, and was handsome. The Lord said, 'Rise and anoint him; for this is the one.' 13Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the presence of his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward. Samuel then set out and went to Ramah 1 Samuel 15 v 34-16v 13

The moving on for Samuel, is pretty terrifying; the Lord instructs him to anoint a replacement for the reigning King, the erratic Saul. Saul who is full of his own ideas, has times of fury, depressions and jealousy; he, Samuel needed courage to move on, to go to Bethlehem. Some reading this may be at this moment or have been in situations where moving on is a real risk, for others moving on is difficult, and leads us to have doubts about where we should go what we should do. We need courage to look forward, and not look back; it is so easy to think that everything was easy long ago.

It is difficult letting go; it is not the same as forgetting. It is a movement; having a new look a new aim, as Samuel lets go of Saul he finds David. Samuel needs to focus on the future 15 v 34 -16 v 1. Anointing a new king when the post is filled is dangerous. Indeed the quest is not only perilous, it becomes puzzling, when Samuel can find no inner conviction about any of the candidates, the 7 sons of Jesse. Had Jesse just forgotten that not all his sons were present. David is the youngest, maybe he was not considered a man, or just someone needed to keep an eye on the sheep, so why bother to send someone to find him.

David is the youngest of 8 brothers is called and 13Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the presence of his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward.

Samuel and David change in this passage. We mourn unfilled hopes as Samuel did as he clings to a dying order, maybe still hoping for the return to the system of Judges. We don't have much of a life if we live in the past. David the youngish son in a large family anointed to be King. Both begin a new stage in their life.

David became the father of a dynasty that would, despite the dreadful ups and downs held on for about 400 years. Much longer than many of the surrounding powers. Each new morning is never the same as we are reminded in John Keeble's hymn: New every morning is the love our wakening and uprising prove,

through sleep and darkness safely brought, restored to life and power and thought.

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Bringing your offerings to God

What are the offerings you bring to God? Here are some reflections on the form our offerings might take.

Money The obvious offering is money. Many churches call the time in the service when we give the church money, 'the offering'. There is a church in Northern Ireland called the *Free Presbyterian Church*. Some irregular churchgoers I know decided to try it out, hoping that because of its title, they'd not have to part with any cash. Imagine their shock and disappointment when the offertory hymn was announced and the collection plate passed around!

Time and Talents Both the Church and The Leprosy Mission rely a great deal on volunteers. Hours upon hours are poured into the building of God's Kingdom each week, by many a faithful servant, doing many a varied task, often using their gifts and talents to serve God. It makes sense that the tasks we spend time on for God over the long term are aligned to our talents. A good question to ask is this: 'Is the majority of time I offer to God spent doing a task that I'm good at?'

'Living sacrifices' Paul encourages us in Romans 12 to offer ourselves as 'living sacrifices'. We might have to think hard to picture what a living sacrifice might look like, but for members of the Roman church, the picture would have been all too vivid! They would have the mental image of a sacrifice indelibly imprinted in their minds. Sacrifice was not just part of the Jewish religious system. Sheep, goats and bulls were offered to the Roman gods on a very regular basis. For part of the ceremony at least, the animal was alive, on the alter – a living sacrifice.

As we seek to follow the exhortation of Paul, and offer ourselves as living sacrifices to God, we might follow the example of Hannah. In 1 Samuel 1:24-28, we read that Hannah offered a number of things to God, After he was weaned, she took the boy with her, young as he was, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour and a skin of wine, and brought him to the house of the Lord at Shiloh. When the bull had been sacrificed, they brought the boy to Eli, and she said to him, "Pardon me, my lord. As surely as you live, I am the woman who stood here beside you praying to the Lord. I prayed for this child, and the Lord has granted me what I asked of him. So now I give him to the Lord. For his whole life he will be given over to the Lord." And he worshiped the Lord there.

A three year old bull was a very expensive offering in itself. Add to it a skin of wine, and 22 litres of flour, and you have a costly offering to God. But Hannah didn't stop there. She also offered her son, Samuel, to God. How gut wrenching and heart breaking this must have been for her.

Samuel grew to be a great man of God, serving God as a prophet and priest. Hannah must have watched on with joy in her heart, as she saw how God used her sacrifice to such great effect.

Our offering to God Take a moment now to offer afresh your time, your wealth, your talents and yourself to God. Consider praying a courageous prayer, a little like the one Hannah did – 'Lord, I offer to you all I have, use this offering as you see fit!'



Burdens

In this life everyone has burdens.... Burdens are always 'heavy weights' - but all burdens are not always necessarily bad...

1) BURDENS GOD WANTS TO RELIEVE US OF.

- (a) Worry burdens (cf Matth.6:25-34)
- (b) Satan-induced burdens (Matth.4:ff-Satan tempted Jesus in the wilderness; Matth.8:16-Jesus delivered all; Matth.8:32-Jesus heals 2 Gadarenes with demons)
- (c) Ministry burdens (Exodus 18-Moses chooses able men; Eph.4:11-16-NT body life)
- (d) Sin burdens: Psalm 38:4,5,18 "For my iniquities have gone over my head;

like a heavy burden, they are too heavy for me.
My wounds stink and fester because of my foolishness.....
I confess my iniquity; I am sorry for my sin." (cf Psalm 51)

2) WHAT BURDENS DOES GOD ALLOW US TO HAVE?

- (a) Times of Testing and Turbulence: John 15:1,2 "I am the True Vine, and my Father is the Vinedresser. Every branch in Me that does not bear fruit He takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit He prunes, that it may bear more fruit."
- (b) Daily challenges (John 16:33-"In this life you will have trouble/burdens....")

 1 Chron.4:10(Jabez-born in pain)"'Oh that You would bless me and enlarge my border and that Your hand might be with me, and that You would keep me from harm/evil, so that it might not bring me pain!' And God granted what he asked."
 - (c) Concern for certain lost people (Luke 15:1ff)(eg TLM concerned for all leprosy folk)
 - (d) Carry one another's burdens, and so fulfil the Law of Christ (Gal. 6:2)
 - (e) Carry your own cross daily (Gal.6:5-self-responsibility; Luke 14:27-self-denial)

3) HOW DOES GOD HELP US IN COPING WITH BURDENS?

- (a) God never gives us more than we can bear!(2Cor.12:9-'My grace is sufficient for you')
- (b) God actually carries us, our burdens and the whole universe, all at the same time! Matth.11:28ff-"Come to Me, all who labour + are heavy laden, + I will give you rest.

 Take My yoke upon you, and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart,

 And you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy, and My burden is light."
- (c) God sovereignly relieves us of certain burdens from time-to-time!

Exodus3:7-11 "Let My people go!"/ The New South Africa?!

Is.43:18,19-"Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old.

Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth do you not perceive it?

I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

CONCLUSION: Ps.55:22-"Cast your burden on the LORD, and He will sustain you.

He will never permit the righteous to be moved."

1Pet.5:6,7-"Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time He may exalt you, casting all your burdens on Him, because He cares for you."

- Amen.

Sheep and Shepherd

I rang Jeff (not his real name) to speak to him, as I was given his name as a possible contact to hold an event. As soon as he picked up the phone, I knew this would not be the case. Jeff's voice was quivery, and his breathing laboured. He was older than our database had indicated. Nonetheless, Jeff's love for Jesus shone out. His desire to see Jesus known was crystal clear.

In the Gospel of John, the apostle draws word pictures. One he uses is that of sheep and shepherds. Jesus sees himself as the loving shepherd (John 10), and also calls us to love and feed his sheep (John 21). We are all sheep called to be shepherds.

Jeff was living this out. He told me he was in a nursing home. Jeff saw this as an opportunity to share about Jesus with all the different staff he was meeting. Jeff had met people affected by leprosy. He was inspired to hear their stories. He wanted them to know Jesus' love for them.

Jeff lived an abundant life – his life story is rich and varied. But at the heart of his abundance is someone who loves Jesus, and who wants to love like Jesus. Both sheep and shepherd. Wherever there were people to love. In his nursing home, or far way; Jeff sought to love them as his shepherd had taught him to. He tells people about Jesus. He prays constantly. He gives financially. Jeff had finds ways to be a shepherd. We are both sheep and shepherd. It leaves me with a challenge, for myself and for us.

Are we remembering that we are sheep Jesus loves?
And are we remembering to seek opportunities to be shepherds?

In the late 1970's while visiting the Congo, I was invited to preach in a church in the North-East. It was a big congregation of a major evangelical denomination celebrating the centenary of mission work in the country.

The whole town was taking part in the celebration with banners, choirs, orchestras, singing, parades a kaleidoscope of colours and a cacophony of sounds. Long before the service started, hundreds of people packed the building and thousands filled up the space around it.

Aiming for a moment of quiet prayer, I went a little way into the jungle behind the building, found an overgrown path which I followed to a spot that had been used as a cemetery.

Looking at the crosses and reading the simple inscriptions carved on planks, I made a startling discovery. "...arrived for Jesus 1880, went to be with Jesus 1883". "....born 1881, went home 1882". In a period of less than 20 years, over 15 men, women and children had died of malaria, fevers, dysentery, snake bites, out of love for Christ and His gospel. Each year, facing rejection, persecution, sickness, death, they kept on coming, seeing very little fruit for their labour but motivated by His love.

One hundred years later, thousands were celebrating and rejoicing in Christ as Saviour. Instead of bringing the message I had prepared, we read the above passage, prayed the prayer "Lord help me to understand what it means to die to self that I may bring forth fruit and give me enough love for you to do it." Then we walked silently past the graves and prayed the same prayer again.

Unless someone guides me – Part 1

"Speak, Lord, for your servant hears." 1 Samuel 3:1-10

The Bible Society has assumed the mission of placing the Bible in the hands of any who would read. Behind this impressive Bible distribution project is the belief that if people would read the Bible, they would hear the word of God as it applies to their lives. There is a case in one African city where people wanted copies of the New Testament not because they wanted to read them but because the Bible paper was great for wrapping and smoking tobacco and other stuff. When the missionaries discovered this they were very upset. But determined to sustain the project they reached an agreement with the youths that they could continue to use the pages of the Bible for their smoking on the condition that they would read each page before the smoke it. Within a few weeks many of these youths were beginning to ask questions about the pages they had read. Some of them eventually turned to the Lord, got baptized and gave up smoking. God works in strange ways! Nevertheless, when we ask the question whether people, alone without any spiritual guidance, are generally able to recognize the word of God when they hear it, we find that the answer is no. The message today show the need for spiritual guidance to help the people discern the word of God that they hear or read.

The fist example is Samuel. Samuel grew up literally in the presence of God. As soon as he was weaned his mother Hannah took him to Eli, priest of the sanctuary in Shiloh. There he was raised by the priest himself. He assisted daily at the altar, he was familiar with the sacred writings, and he got the best religious formation available. Yet when the word of god came to him personally he could not recognize it. Each time God called he thought that it was Eli. It was not until Eli directed him on what to do that he finally succeeded in establishing a connection with God who was trying to reach him. Why didn't God just come to Samuel and say: "Samuel! Samuel! It is I the Lord your God. Now listen up?" Why did God have to speak to Samuel in a voice that could be mistaken for Eli's? God normally works through the ordinary channels that he has established. That is why we need the church and need priests. These are the normal channels of God's word and God's grace in our lives (Hebrews 5:1). God can, of course, always go beyond these channels, but that is not for us to presume or take for granted.

Unless someone guides me - Part 2

The next day John was there again with two of his disciples. ³⁶ When he saw Jesus passing by, he said, "Look, the Lamb of God!" ³⁷ When the two disciples heard him say this, they followed Jesus. ³⁸ Turning around, Jesus saw them following and asked, "What do you want?" They said, "Rabbi" (which means "Teacher"), "where are you staying?" ³⁹ "Come," he replied, "and you will see." So they went and saw where he was staying, and they spent that day with him. It was about four in the afternoon. ⁴⁰ Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, was one of the two who heard what John had said and who had followed Jesus. ⁴¹ The first thing Andrew did was to find his brother Simon and tell him, "We have found the Messiah" (that is, the Christ). ⁴² And he brought him to Jesus.Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You will be called Cephas" (which, when translated, is Peter). John 1,35-42 NIV

Something similar also happens in the gospel. Andrew and John's other disciple had followed John as a way of preparing for the One who is to come. For years they had prayed and fasted and waited for the joy of meeting the Messiah. Yet when they finally came face to face with the Messiah Himself, they could not recognize Him. And they said to him, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where are you staying?" (John 1: 38). Again it took the guidance of their spiritual master, John for them to recognize the messiah. These disciple of John had a divine call to become disciples of Jesus. But they could not discover what divine Providence had in store for them until a spiritual director pointed it to them. There will always be the need for priests like Eli and prophets like John to point out Christ to us and to help us discern what God is saying to us in our lives as individuals and as a people.

The practice of spiritual direction where people go to priests to help them discern what God is saying to them regarding the direction their lives should take has declined greatly in our time. Today we expect professional counsellors who may or may not share our faith and vision as Christians to fulfil this role. But only a consecrated leader who is in sync with the spirit of God can help to discern the presence of God and the import of God's word in our lives. Christianity is not a do-it- yourself religion. Our model today is the Ethiopian finance minister who was reading the Bible and the deacon Philip asked him, "Do you understand what you are reading?" What did he answer? "How can I, unless someone guides me?" (Acts 8:30-31). We could pray thus:

Lord, as I begin to take stock of achievements this year and marshal out plans for the coming, I seek your divine guidance through your anointed messengers to reap from your bounty. Jesus, I trust in You.

Faith in tough times

There is a particular Wednesday in 2012 that I will never forget. My 87-year old mother had been to a meeting at her church, and was walking with her zimmer frame up the road to her hairdresser's when she had a fall and badly hurt her right arm and shoulder. But being my mum, she continued to the hairdressers, and only after her hair had been cut and dressed did I get the phone call to pick her up and take her to the hospital!

To cut a long story short, after an extremely long, painful wait an x-ray confirmed that the bone in her upper arm was badly broken, and I gave her the news. She was badly frightened by the implications of what this would mean to her independence, but her immediate response was to pray these words aloud from her favourite hymn:

Father, hear the prayer we offer, Not for ease that prayer should be, But for strength that we might ever Live our lives courageously.

Be our strength in hours of weakness, In our wanderings be our guide, Through endeavour, failure, danger, Father, be Thou at our side.

Mum had never really talked about her faith, and until that moment I had not appreciated the depth of her trust in God. It was a clear reminder that it is in the times when we are at the end of our tether that our faith will most clearly shine out to those around us.

That hymn has become so precious to me, and I hope it continues to stand the test of time.

Keep up the good Work

When I was clearing out books and papers, I came across a prayer, tucked into a book (I have updated the language a little) "O Lord God, when you give your servants to a job to do, make us also to know that it is not the beginning, but the continuing of the same, until it be thoroughly finished, which yields the true glory; through him who for the finishing of your work laid down his life for us, our Redeemer, Jesus Christ. Amen. This reminds us of the encouragement in Hebrews 6:9-12 to continue with the same diligence to the very end.

I tucked that prayer away again in a notebook I refer to frequently. However, just this last week, I was reading an Advent Book (yes, I know it is a bit early but I was preparing for something and felt that this book might give me the right direction), and came upon this prayer again. I now know it was written originally by Sir Francis Drake who was famous in England during the reign of Elizabeth 1 in the 16th century. He was an interesting man – he sailed round the world, crossed the Atlantic many times, was involved in many sea battles (including the defeat of the Spanish Armada), he once spread his cloak over a muddy puddle so that the Queen could walk without getting her feet wet, he even tried to claim California as a British possession.

I don't know what great work Drake was thinking of when he wrote this prayer, but whatever it was not only had to be started but it had to be worked through until it was thoroughly completed. Most of us will recognise the sentiment - we start projects and then either they become too difficult or too time consuming or we just lose interest or maybe even it is a project we are just not equipped to do. Sometimes we get so far into the project and our initial enthusiasm wanes somewhat and it becomes a real struggle and we really need to buckle down to it, one step at a time. But what joy when we get to the end and we can rejoice, and maybe look for the next big project.

Sometimes, our Christian lives can be a bit like that – whether it is our time with God each day, our time of prayer, our service for the Lord, or even our daily work – we start out with great enthusiasm but as the days go on we find it difficult, temptations come our way or we think of other things to do. The picture in Hebrews 6: of the Christian community working together, demonstrating the love of God within their fellowship and to those around them is one to which we would all aspire whether as individuals or a church. Because God has taken note of what they have been doing we are told He will not let them fall away. But at the same time just because

God will not forget what they have done, they have to make every possible effort to continue their life of faith and persevere, avoiding temptations to be lazy, "until it is thoroughly finished". Verse 12 reminds us that there are others on this journey and we should be encouraged by their efforts too.

Sometimes we become discouraged in our service, sometimes we become lazy in our praying, sometimes we "are too busy" to spend time with the Lord. I pray that if that is your situation that you might be encouraged by this prayer of Sir Francis Drake, by the example of the Christian community being addressed in the chapter 6 of Hebrews, and indeed by the example of Jesus Himself who proclaimed from the cross that His task to bring us Salvation was ended "it is finished".

God bless you this day as you serve Him.

Serving the Poor; A Privilege - Part 1

What is God's Will for me to serve the poor?

In the current day world there are two broad approaches to meet the needs of the poor — Welfare/Service Delivery Vs Rights Based. The author and creator of the universe, God Himself addresses both aspects in the Scriptures and commands us what must we do.

A few scriptures

- Matthew 25:35-36, 40 "For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave
 me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I
 was sick and you looked after me..'; "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the
 least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."
- James 2:15-17 "Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it?"
- 1 John 3:17 "But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him?"
- Proverbs 31:8-9 "Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy."

Discerning the Scriptures

The poor, the thirsty, the hungry, the homeless live alongside us. It is a fact. Inequities exist in this world. Turning a blind eye to them is ignoring the truth and realty. Nurturing the physical body is as significant as the spiritual body. They are inter-related. Providing for the physical needs of the poor is as important as for their spiritual needs. Gospel is one, whether for salvation of the soul or for social upliftment. Social gospel has its legitimate role in fulfilling God's Will for us. Physical life and eternal life go together.

The Gospel – Good News of Jesus the Saviour must be manifested. Not only in words but in actions. Empty vessels make much noise but serve no purpose. If we are filled with His love, we must be the vessels to pour it out into others through our words and actions. Saving grace of Jesus has a purpose - worship Him and demonstrate our love for Him.

People in need experience the love of Jesus through us; our actions which are propelled by our own gratefulness to Him. Loving the poor and serving them is serving Jesus. God is glorified when we serve the poor. God is manifested. Evidence of His presence in my Spirit. No love for the poor means no love for Him and no presence of His Holy Spirit in my life. Serving comes out of love in one's heart. It is a heart matter. Outward actions sustained by inward love (St Francis of Assisi "It would be considered a theft on our part if we didn't give to someone in greater need than we are.").

On the judgement day what we had done for the poor in our life in this world, counts in our favour or against. There are no ifs and buts. It's as white as white and as black as black, not grey. The judgement will be meted out to us subject to our response to the opportunity God creates for us to serve the poor, in gratitude for His glory. Serving the poor is an opportunity for us to manifest our love for Jesus and overcome the works of the devil.

Economic inequities lead to vulnerability, denial of rights and injustice for the poor people. We are commanded to stand up for their rights, restore equity, justice and dignity. Be the voice for the voiceless.

Nobuhle, kwaZulu Natal, South Africa

Nobuhle was half-way through primary school at Port Shepstone on the lower South Coast of kwaZulu Natal when the first signs of leprosy appeared on her skin.

Seven years later, despite many visits to clinics and hospitals, no one was able to tell her what was wrong with her. Her eyes no longer closed properly when she slept. Nobuhle began to lose feeling in her hands and feet. Worst of all, Nobuhle was beginning to lose hope.

Fortunately for Nobuhle, she met Lucky Kunene, the Leprosy Mission's field worker in kwaZulu Natal.

Lucky takes up the story:

John 10,10 "Nobuhle was down in her spirits when we met.

"Her classmates were teasing her and she was about to drop out of school. It was so sad to see the injuries to her body. She was spending most of her time indoors to hide her wounds."

Lucky arranged for Nobuhle to start leprosy treatment and showed her how to avoid injuries to those parts of her body where she no longer felt pain. He invited Nobuhle to a Christian youth camp. Nobuhle was blown away by the experience.

"I was scared that people at the youth camp would laugh at me, but I found new friends and we enjoyed ourselves. I thought I was useless, but pastor Mahlangu said that God knew me from before I was born. He will bring me home."

"You gave me a chance to find a way to make my future better. Because of you, I am born again. Now I know what to do to make my future bright."

"I am writing to tell you about the joy I have in my life.

"Thank you for sending me to the youth camp. I was nervous when I went. I didn't finish school because the children teased me about my leprosy. My heart was hurt. I started doing funny things like taking drugs.

"I learned so many things about Jesus. I connected my life to Jesus. I know the Bible is the Word of God. It is the manual for my life.

"I got all this knowledge and skills because of you. I thank you very much. God will bless you."

"If you don't know God, your life will end in a bad situation. You must know your destiny. Thank you for giving me the chance to have this good experience at this beautiful place."

The Leprosy Mission arranged for Nobuhle to subsequently attend several weeks of intensive counselling at a rehabilitation centre.

Please pray for her. We haven't had contact with her for a while and are concerned about her situation.

I was hit by a shower of toilet rolls this morning. Fortunately not the brand that has the puppy attached. Just ordinary toilet rolls. We buy them 16 at a time - toilet rolls, not puppies - because they're cheaper that way and there's no telling when emergencies happen, which is why they're called emergencies I suppose.

We store the rolls in a wall cupboard above the doors of the fitted wardrobe in our bedroom. But when I slid open the wardrobe door looking for a clean shirt, down came the toilet tissue on my head.

"Stuff happens", as the American politician said, most of it a lot more difficult to cope with than that, and we can't really prepare ourselves for it. My immediate reaction when something unpleasant happens is to ask, "Why me?" Sometimes there is a reason. In this case I was in a hurry and just threw the rolls into the cupboard without checking whether they were safe or not, and so, later on, down they came.

But more often we can't identify a reason, and there's no point in looking for one. You just pick up the loo rolls, or whatever it was that hit you, and try to find the strength to carry on. And usually, if we've sown the seeds of friendship beforehand, we'll find there's someone who will help us pick up the fallen debris.

Lord, when life falls down on us, thank you for the friends who help me pick up the pieces.

Eddie Askew (1927-2007) devoted half a century to leprosy and its consequences. In 1950 he and his wife Barbara set sail for India. Eddie's first placement was in Purulia, West Bengal. In 1965 Eddie took up the post of executive secretary at TLM's office in London. His first overseas visit in this new role was to Ethiopia, where he learned of plans to set up a leprosy training centre that would benefit patients and medics throughout Africa. He offered to become a founding member and signed TLM up to support what was to become ALERT (All Africa Leprosy and Rehabilitation Training Centre). The following year, the organisation now known as the International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Associations (ILEP) was set up. In 1974 Eddie became general director of TLM. He was keen to develop TLM's work elsewhere, and took a team into the closed land of Bhutan in response to a request from its government. - Inspired by his travels and his Christian faith, Eddie found an outlet for his creativity in painting and poetry. He retired in 1987. From 1998 until his death he was TLM- vice-president, and in 2000 he was awarded an OBE. (Fiona Spence)

Will you prolong your anger through all generations? ⁶ Will you not revive us again, that your people may rejoice in you? ⁷Show us your unfailing love, LORD, and grant us your salvation. ⁸I will listen to what God the LORD says; he promises peace to his people, his faithful servants but let them not turn to folly. ⁹ Surely his salvation is near those who fear him, that his glory may dwell in our land. ¹⁰ Love and faithfulness meet together; righteousness and peace kiss each other. ¹¹ Faithfulness springs forth from the earth, and righteousness looks down from heaven. ¹²The LORD will indeed give what is good, and our land will yield its harvest. ¹³ Righteousness goes before him and prepares the way for his steps.

Life in all its Fullness – 3.

Transformation - Part 1

Now when he saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to him,

- Mt 5:2 and he began to teach them, saying:
- $^{\text{Mt}\,5:3}$ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- Mt 5:4 Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
- Mt 5:5 Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
- Mt 5:6 Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
- Mt 5:7 Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.
- Mt 5:8 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
- Mt 5:9 Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God.
- $^{ ext{Mt}\,5:10}$ Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- Mt 5:11 "Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me.

Mt 5:12 Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you. (NIV Translation)

The Leprosy Mission is all about transformation, about lives transformed.

At the Members Meeting we heard wonderful stories of lives being transformed in various ways.

In the above passage, usually referred to as The Sermon on the Mount, we see Jesus' promise of transformation as we live a radical, different lifestyle which comes from following Him.

Let's not get involved with the Greek word translated here as 'blessed', or whether we are talking about spiritual poverty or physical poverty etc.

Let's look at the hope for transformation from one situation to another.

Each 'beatitude' recognizes where the person currently is, they are spiritually poor, mourning/unhappy or suffering from their loyalty to God, seeking justice (there is no justice), spiritually or physically hungry and so on. However, they are called 'blessed/happy/fortunate/well off' because they have *hope* for the future.

The spiritually poor can have hope for the Kingdom of Heaven thus they are blessed; those mourning are blessed because they have the hope of God's comfort, the merciful are blessed because of their hope in God's mercy and so forth.

For each person, in whatever state they are in, there is *hope*. God gives them *hope* for what is to come, that the state they are in will not always be the same, and so they are *blessed* because they have hope for the *transformation* that is to come, sometime in the future.

I would add 'Blessed are those in TLM because they have the hope of seeing a world and a people transformed, because there is no longer any leprosy, and they walk in God's way receiving God's blessing. Prayer:

Lord, we thank and praise you for the transformation we can experience when we accept you as our Lord and Saviour. We are grateful and blessed for the hope you give us. May we be generous in our sharing, with others, our knowledge of you. Amen.

Life in all its Fullness - 4.

Transformation - Part 2

Mark 5:1-12

As we continue to think about transformation there seems to be two sorts of transformation.

Lives can be, often immediately, transformed when one accepts Jesus as Lord and Savior. And then the transformation continues, usually slowly, throughout ones life as Jesus, through the Holy Spirit, continues to refine and make us more Christ like.

However, there is another sort of transformation that is not necessarily spiritual.

People's lives can be transformed in all sorts of ways – in TLM we see people cured of leprosy, hands made useful again, livelihoods created and lives changed drastically resulting in transformation.

Yet it seems that transformation can only take place if we are prepared to be involved. Transformation doesn't take place just by itself. We have to play our part.

Spiritually we have to accept Jesus; we have to take that leap of faith.

Physically too we have to play our part. A person *has* to take their medicine if they are to be cured; they *have* to do the hard slog of physio if the surgery is to be effective, they *have* to look after their goats if they want to make a new start in life, the children *have* to go to school if they want an education.

The Leprosy Mission holds out the *hope* of transformation, either spiritually or physically, however the person has to play their part if there is to be transformation.

And of course God has been constantly transforming TLM over these many years. No longer do people endure the agony of chaulmoogra oil treatment in the vague possibility of a cure, now pills can guarantee a cure. No longer is leprosy thought to be a curse but we know it is a medical condition. No longer do people travel months on a boat but hours on a plane. No longer do we wear button up boots....

Indeed I have seen amazing transformation within TLM in the years I have been involved, most recently the forming of The Global Fellowship

We have much to thank and praise God for in this transformation.

Prayer:

Thank you Lord that you want to transform our lives and situations. Thank you that you want us to enjoy freedom which only you can give. Give us courage to be open to hear what you want to do in our lives, and to be ready to play our part in your transforming work.

We pray you would continue to bless and transform TLM, and give your courage to guide this work in new and different ways as you lead. .

Amen.

Transformation - Part 3

Mark 5:1-12

Let me tell you briefly about the transformation in the life of a person within TLM, who did *not* have leprosy. This person, well it was a woman, found it impossible to talk publically.

Because she was a part of TLM she would often be asked to speak about the work of the mission. Fortunately for her, her husband was a gifted speaker, and so after she had made herself physically ill about whatever she had been asked to do, he would offer to go and speak on her behalf.

This worked for her for quite some time, before she decided, in 1986, that she could not continue to live this way. She realised God could not change her while she continued to sit and say, 'I can't do this, I can't do this....' He could only change her if she was involved and doing something.

So she said to God that she would have a go at everything that she was asked to do, and trusted God to get her through.

The very first thing she was asked to do, after this decision, was to go and read the Bible to a very small group of older women. How simple you say, but no, not for this lady, she got herself into such a state that she ended up asking a friend to go with her!!

As an aside, if you needed proof of there being a God this could be it. She wasn't asked to something big and bold, just the most simple, unthreatening little thing. How gracious is our God.

Often in the beginning only a little squeak would come out as she tried to speak from her prepared notes. As the years went by she had a go at everything she was asked to do, often after spending long hours on her knees! She often didn't do things well, but she did them.

Just as she was becoming vaguely good at a certain level, something harder would come along.

Incredibly to her, she was invited onto TLMA Board in 1994. Of course she didn't contribute much as she was nervous of her opinions and ability to speak them out.

Then in 2002, she was asked to take over a small TLM Support Group which Ian Milne (previous TLMA and TLMI Chair) had started, as he was shifting to another area. God had found something a bit harder again!! She found if she prepared every single word she could get by. 'Welcome everyone and a special welcome to..... etc etc'

After a few years she could manage with just 'cheat sheets' and by now she was taking part in discussions on the Board, and representing TLM reasonably well at meetings.

To her amazement she became Chair of TLMAustralia in 2012 and quickly found herself overseeing a major restructure, requiring her to fly around Australia making TLM personnel redundant. God was, of course, faithful and she came through this extremely unpopular and difficult time still standing!

In 2013, to her astonishment, she found herself on the Global Fellowship Board – and in 2018 I found myself telling my story at the Members Meeting and then leading Board devotions on my last day on this Board. Yes, our God is certainly into transformation.

Lord, we thank you for the transforming work you have done in each of our lives, and we ask that you would continue this work until we are the people you want us to be.

We also ask you to kindly lead and guide us today in all we do and say, that you would give us your wisdom in the decisions we need to make. Amen
